

## Locality (on this 1er Cru): Monopole

Origin of the name of the climate and the locality, explanation of the grouping: This historical plot belongs to Château de Fuissé (probably dating back to its creation under Hugues Capet). A true Burgundian "Clos," it surrounds the property on three sides, with a length of approximately 500 linear meters and a height of about 1.5 meters. It was built using the ancestral dry stone method, with limestone stones extracted directly from the plot. It was a way for the Lord of Fuissé to preserve and assert his territory.

<u>Claim to this climate</u>: Wine production has been documented since the 14th century on the Lordship of Fuissé, probably originating from this plot. The plot was affirmed from the early 20th century by the Vincent family (acquired in 1862). Old vines planted in 1929 are the majority.

## Specificity of this 1er Cru: Monopole

<u>Organoleptic profile of this climat</u>: Wines with personality, a lot of texture, fruitiness, and a high level of aromatic complexity. They excel in barrel aging and bottle maturation.



- Area: 2 hectares, 68 ares, 42 centiares
- Locality: Fuissé
- Soil: This plot features three types of brown, sloping soils. It has limestone soils with few stones at the top of the slope, stony and limestone soils in the middle, and deeper clayey brown soils at the bottom.
- Altitude: 265 to 290 meters
- Exposure: East/Southeast orientation
- <u>Slope</u>: Located on the opposite side of Mont Pouilly, it has an 11% slope.
